Broker Survey on Employer Health Insurance for 2014-2015


The Affordable Care Act has transformed the individual insurance market in well-documented ways. However, far less is known about how it has affected employer-sponsored insurance. Brokers play a critical role in this ecosystem, serving as counselors and advisors to companies of all sizes. Their access to renewal data for 2015 group plans provides a timely perspective on how regulatory changes are affecting employers. On October 29-30, we surveyed 1,028 brokers on the impact of group premium increases.



Average rate increase this year




In worst cases, rates have increased by more than 60%

Q: What percent of your business to you expect to switch to individual by the end of next year?




Why are employers dropping health coverage?

For some employers, health insurance is no longer affordable. For others, their employees can actually find more affordable options on the individual market.

Individual coverage is often more affordable due to rich federal subsidies (premiumtax-credits), whose value is oftentimes far greater than employer penalties for not providing coverage
